Reconciliation Action Plan development

- Consultation with the Bunurong Land Council Aboriginal Corporation and the broader First Nations community is completed and we will now commence writing the draft Reconciliation Action Plan (Stretch) with consideration of the input we've had from key stakeholders and alignment with our strategic and business objectives.
- The draft will be reviewed by the Board and Management team before being submitted to Reconciliation Australia for review and endorsement, a process that can take up to three months.
- Once endorsed, we will organise a formal event to launch the RAP and celebrate our continued commitment to Reconciliation. We will then do a Roadshow of the RAP to share it with each team across the business as well as volunteers.



RECONCILIATION UPDATE SEPTEMBER 2023

Reconciliation Advisory Committee

The Committee met on 9 August at the Nobbies, covering the following agenda items:

- An overview of the 2023 Reconciliation Events overall attendance of over 1200 people to four major events.
- Results of implementation of the Reconciliation Action Plan (Stretch) 2019-2022 we successfully completed 75% of deliverables with work continuing on 12 deliverables.
- An update on the RAP development process.
- Progress and achievement on the Yarning Circle project keep reading for more information.

The Committee supported Kate Adams and Dion Triptree to attend a Reconciliation Roadshow event on Tuesday 22 August, hosted by Reconciliation Australia. It was a great opportunity to meet and yarn with people from other organisations that have Reconciliation Action Plans (RAP). Key speakers at the event spoke about the role that organisations can play in achieving a just and reconciled nation, reflection of performance by organisations with RAPs, and how to support mob in self-determination. They also gained valuable tips and insight into how to effectively implement RAP actions in our business.

Yarning Circle Project

The Yarning Circle project commenced in April 2023 and has been progressing nicely with First Nations artists, Arieta, Lenna and Rhylee doing some great work on the painting and mosaic artworks for this cultural space. We've also held a Community Planting Day where they got to meet and work with Traditional Owners and members of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Community.

One of the aims of the project is to teach Arieta, Lenna and Rhylee about the process of working as a professional artist, and through mentoring from local Aboriginal artist, Patrice Mahoney OAM, mosaic artist Heather Fahnle and local visual artist, Lizzy Rich, they are learning about:

- Commissioning process (application, agreement, commitment)
- Research, design, planning and safety
- Exploring artistic techniques (colours, textures, motifs, mosaic, materials)
- Decision making, leadership, teamwork, working in a public space
- Intergenerational cultural learning by working with other First Nations people

The project is supported by a Parks Victoria Volunteer Innovation Fund grant to engage youth volunteers; Jesse and Mia have also been contributing to the artworks in creating beautiful mosaic pavers and tiles that will feature in the space.

Ash Reed, Andrea Love and Les Briggs from the Conservation team are supporting the project to create the surrounding garden beds that will feature native plants including threatened species as well as species that are significant to Bunurong. We will hold another planting day in the coming months to continue our work with youth volunteers and Community.

We hope to have the area completed and an official opening in December!
